FBYC SPOTLIGHT, THIS MONTH, IS ON OUR MEMBERS......



ED AND LYNN URIBE

Lynn has been boating since she was a little girl. She was born in a boat house, and always around boats, (her father owned a boat yard); she piloted her first at the age of 8. Ed while in Junior High School, at the age of 15 1/2, joined the New York National Guard. At 18 he obtained his airplane mechanic's license. Ed's introduction to boating, so to speak, when after completing High School, joined the Air Force where he became a flight engineer on amphibious planes. He was stationed in Okinawa, traveled about the Far East and even had to get a passport to Saigon in the early 60's. After leaving the Air Force he served as a policeman in New York City for about 7 years. Part of the time he was "undercover". During this time he received national attention (only he can share that story with justice!). Choosing to leave the police force he then was employed in private security firms and eventually became a partner.

After marrying Lynn, she finally convinced Ed to sell the '65 Mustang he had rebuilt to purchase their first boat. In November they will have been married 48 years and have boated regularly. They raised four children, one of whom is a nephew now a Tug Boat Captain in the NY area.

They currently have a 22 ft Sea Ray, and will occasionally dock in a marina for a few nights in addition to day trips. They traveled extensively in NY, NJ, Connecticut area often with the Yacht Club they belonged to in NY. For years, Lynn served as the trip planner/coordinator. (They have many interesting stories to share, including an 18 boat rafting.) In addition to being an active members of the FBYC, Ed is Dock Master for Canopy Walk Marina. Lynn, for fun, plays Texas Hold-M; she recently won first place in a tournament.

Both Ed and Lynn expressed very positive feelings about our Club. Lynn, who was diagnosed with Cancer three years ago, said she will never forget Joe Lindholm, himself a cancer victim, calling to offer support not only during her bout with chemotherapy but afterwards as well.

Their introduction to Palm Coast was in the 1980's when ITT was building in the area and offered free trips. They ultimately bought two lots which they then used as a down payment on a home in the C section however, for personal reasons they did not move in as planned.

They rented their home, and when Ed retired they moved down and now live in Canopy Walk.

Len and Carol just celebrated their first wedding anniversary. Six years ago, Carol, who lived in New Jersey, came to Palm Coast to visit a friend. The friend picked her up at the airport; that evening and they went to the Italian American Club where she met Len for the first time. Carol returned to NJ where she and Len texted and talked to each other until she moved down here. The rest is history! Carol, from her former marriage has two grown daughters, and four grand-children; all live in NJ. Len, has two sons, both living in Colorado, and two daughters one living in Tampa and one in Virginia. He also has four grandchildren. Carol and Len spend a great deal of their time with their blended family; many of their "vacation" trips are to visit one or more members. (All of Len's family will be here shortly for the marriage of one of Len's granddaughters.)

Carol said she worked like a crazy person for too many years. Most of her employment was in and around the printing business. For fifteen of those years she was a business owner, managing 22 employees, supporting multiple contracts with large pharmaceutical companies. She had a brief interlude with boating in NJ.

Len, who is our only Commodore who has never owned a boat, grew up in Troy, New York and spent twenty years in the Air Force, 1964-84, as a Logistics Manager. The first half of his children's lives were primarily spent out of the country. He was stationed in Turkey, Germany, Italy, Iran, Greece and France, in addition to Alaska and the "lower 48". Upon retiring from the AF in Colorado he went to work for Lockheed Martin, first for the Peacekeeper Missile (nuclear weapons) program, and then for the Titan Missile program where he served as part of the launch support team, launching satellites for the military, national interests and commercial purposes. In that capacity he traveled regularly to Vandenburg Air Force base in California and Cape Canaveral. His wife, Connie, who he married in 1967, as he would be away from home for weeks, would fly down to Florida for weekends; they traveled around Florida. On one occasion they visited a friend in Palm Coast and bought land. (Connie, who passed away 8 years ago was also a member of the FBYC.) When he retired, Len said Connie told him that she had followed him for 37 years and she was retiring to Florida and that it was now time for him to follow her!

Steps to Smooth Anchoring


At some point in your boating career you will probably want to anchor. You may want to stop and fish, swim, have lunch or stay overnight. A second reason to drop anchor may be to control the boat if bad weather is blowing you ashore or if your engine has quit and the wind and current are pushing you into shallow water or other boats.

The first step in anchoring is to select the proper anchor. In spite of claims to the contrary, there is no single anchor design that is best in all conditions. On most pleasure boats, the three anchors you will find most are the *fluke* or danforth type, the *plow* and the *mushroom* anchor.

Mushroom anchors do not have the holding power of a fluke or plow anchor and should only be used on small, lighter weight boats. A local marine supply store can help you select the proper anchor for your boat and for the waters in which you will be boating.

Anchors also must have something to attach them to the boat. This is called the *anchor rode* and may consist of line, chain or a combination of both. The whole system of gear including anchor, rode, shackles etc. is called ground tackle.

The amount of rode that you have out (scope) when at anchor depends generally on water depth and weather conditions. The deeper the water and the more severe the weather, the more rode you will put out. For recreational boaters, at a minimum you should have out five to eight times (5 to 1 scope for day anchoring and 6 to 8 to 1 for overnight) the depth of the water plus the distance from the water to where the anchor will attach to the bow. For example, if you measure water depth and it shows four feet and it is three feet from the top of the water to your bow cleat, you would multiply seven feet by six to eight to get the amount of rode to put out.





- Select an area that offers maximum shelter from wind, current, boat traffic etc.
- Pick a spot with swinging room in all directions. Should the wind change, your boat will swing bow to the wind or current, whichever is stronger.
- Determine depth and bottom conditions and calculate the amount of rode you will put out.
- If other boats are anchored in the area you select, ask the boat adjacent to the spot you select what scope they have out so that you can anchor in such a manner that you will not bump into the neighboring vessel.
- Anchor with the same method used by nearby boats. If they are anchored bow and stern, you should too. If they are anchored with a single anchor from the bow, do not anchor bow and stern. Never anchor from the stern alone, this could cause the boat to swamp or capsize.
- Rig the anchor and rode. Check shackles to make sure they are secured with wire tied to prevent the screw shaft from opening.
- Lay out the amount of rode you will need on deck in such a manner that it will follow the anchor into the water smoothly without tangling.
- Cleat off the anchor line at the point you want it to stop. (Don't forget or you'll be diving for your anchor.)
- Stop your boat and lower your anchor until it lies on the bottom. This should be done upwind or up-current from the spot you have selected. Slowly start to motor back, letting out the anchor rode. Backing down slowly will assure that the chain will not foul the anchor and prevent it from digging into the bottom.
- When all the anchor line has been let out, back down on the anchor with engine in idle reverse to help set the anchor. (Be careful not to get the anchor line caught in your prop.)
- While reversing on a set anchor, keep a hand on the anchor line. A dragging anchor will telegraph itself as it bumps along the bottom. An anchor that is set will not shake the line.
- When the anchor is firmly set, look around for reference points in relation to the boat. You can sight over your compass to get the bearing of two different fixed points (house, rock, tower, etc.) Over the next hour or so, make sure those reference points are in the same place. If not you're probably dragging anchor.
- Begin anchor watch. Everyone should check occasionally to make sure you're not drifting.




